PHILIPPIANS

1. TITLES:

- A. The Epistle to the Philippians
- B. The Book of Joy and Rejoicing

2. AUTHOR:

Written by Paul, the apostle to the Gentiles.

3. DATE:

Probably written between 60 and 64 A.D. during Paul's first imprisonment at Rome (Acts 28).

4. KEY WORDS:

- A. Joy, Rejoice 18
- B. Mind (ed, s) 10

5. KEY VERSES: 2:2; 4:4

6. PURPOSE:

- A. To thank the church for their gifts and to inform them of Paul's intended visit.
- B. To warn them against the Judaizing false teachers.
- C. To exhort them to be likeminded by having the mind of Christ.
- D. To encourage them to <u>rejoice</u> in all circumstances.

7. MESSAGE:

- A. The Christian life is one of joy and <u>rejoicing</u> which is independent of all circumstances.
- B. The key to unity (being <u>likeminded</u>) is having the <u>mind</u> of Christ.

9. SUMMARY:

The church at Philippi was founded by Paul and Silas on Paul's second missionary journey (Acts 16). Some of the first converts were gained as a result of Paul's <u>rejoicing</u> while in prison and it is very fitting that Paul while in prison at Rome would write an epistle of joy to this church. The theme of joy and <u>rejoicing</u> can be traced through the epistle as follows: Joy and Prayer (1:4-6), Joy and Opposition (1:14-18), Joy and Faith (1:25, 26), Joy and Unity (2:2), Joy and Ministry (2:14-16), Joy and Sacrifice (2:17, 18), Joy and Victory (2:25-29), Rejoicing in the Lord (3:1-3), Rejoicing Always (4:4), Rejoicing in All Circumstances (4:10-12). It is also interesting to note that faith, love, unity, and humility are seen as being at the root of joy.

10. CHRIST SEEN:

Christ is seen as our <u>Joy</u>, our <u>Life</u>, our <u>Mind</u>, our <u>Goal</u>, and our <u>Strength</u>.
